

Sigma Nu, Sigma Chi Clash Today

Two undefeated teams, Sigma Chi and Sigma Nu, will battle for the Interfraternity League touch football championship on Lower Alumni Field at 4:30 p.m. today.

The winner will earn the right to face the Doormats, Independent titleholders, for the Intramural crown.

Yesterday morning's CORNELL DAILY SUN incorrectly reported that ATO had downed Sigma Chi, six first downs to two, after the teams had fought to a 6-6 deadlock in the semifinals.

THE SUN wearily apologizes, and lays the blame at the feet of a garbled teletype report received from Lower Alumni in the dim hours of the morning. Sigma Chi, sparked by Howie Ross's 35-yard interception runback in the last minute of play, was the victor by a margin of six first to two.

This afternoon's struggle promises to be a titanic epic, as Sigma Chi pits a line reputed to be the best in the league, against the opposition's trio of hard running and passing backs.

The "Sweethearts" low, hard charging forward wall has provided able protection for Dave Allen, shifty runner, Joe Jamieson, passer and kicker par excellence, aided by the blocking of Howie Ross.

Against this lineup Sigma Nu presents a team which has yielded only one score all season. Charley Berman, Bill Girardi, and Hugh Dean, who also punts, share the running and passing duties for the "White Star" band. On the line tackles Jim Palmer and Capt. Tom Cohill have been giving the opposition a hard time all season, with an assist to the able backing up performance of center Bob Hamilton.

Both teams are favored for this clash—each by its respectful cohorts. A half keg of refreshments has been put up as a side prize by one of Ithaca's more respectable business establishments.

Aggie Wingman Captures Pass Receiving Title

New York, Dec. 12—(AP)—Neill Armstrong of Oklahoma A. & M. was the No. 1 pass receiver among all the college football players during the past season, an honor he also won as a freshman in 1943.

Final figures for the season, released today by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau, show that the Aggie wingman hauled down 32 forward passes in ten games for 479 yards.

The man who caught the passes which counted most, however, was Tommy Kalmanir of Nevada, although his 17 catches did not land him among the leaders. Kalmanir averaged 27.5 yards per catch, high for the season and just a yard short of the national record set by Lamar Davis of Georgia in 1942, and gathered in nine touchdown passes, 50 per cent more than any other player.

He was on the receiving end of the most potent battery combination in college football this year, the thrower being Bill Mackrides, whose 56 completed passes went for 1,254 yards and 17 touchdowns—tops in both departments.

The man who picked up the most yardage in running back intercepted passes was Joe Golding of Oklahoma, although he intercepted only three. His three runs totalled 177 yards.

Harry Gilmer took top honors in returning punts, covering 436 yards on 37 runbacks. Although he returned only eight punts, Jack Mitchell of Oklahoma averaged
